Dr. Esther Antoine-Dardignac is an anesthesiologist working with Nos Petits Frères et Souers in Haiti. She graduated from ELAM (Escuela Latino-Americano) Faculted #2 in Santiago, Cuba in 2006 and completed residency in anesthesia at Hôpital de l'Université d'Etat d'Haiti (HUEH) 2016. Dr. Antoine-Dardignac has been married for eight years to her husband, Hugue Dardignac, and they live with their 5-year old daughter, Andriana Sterline, in Port-au-Prince.

Dr. Benoucheca Pierre is an anesthesiologist also working with Nos Petits Frères et Soeurs. She attended medical school in Haiti at Universitè Notre Dame d'Haiti and completed a residency in anesthesia at HUEH in 2015. Dr. Pierre married her husband, Saveur MacKendy, in 2014, and they live with their 20-month old son, BecKendy Angel Saveur, in Port-au-Prince.

## Purpose of My Life...

Since 2014, the fixed clinic has provided primary medical care and is gaining a reputation for quality care in OB-GYN and pediatrics.



Dr. Wilkens Gilbert, Medical Director, and Pharah Ilvers, RN, Head Nurse Coordinator, and the staff of CMCQ and Karavàn Lasante are shining examples of Haitians healing Haitians. We asked Pharah to introduce herself with some biographical information. Here is what she shared:

"My name is Pharah Ilvers and I am 26 years old, а Registered Nurse and a law student. I was born in Cap-Haitien and stayed there until I was 23. I don't have much free times, but when I do, I like to read and watch medical or law series like Grey's Anatomy or Suits or Scandal. I also like to write and spend time writing story or thoughts about Haitian life. My childhood was

not easy like many Haitians but I have very good memories. Of course, I have bad memories too.

"One person I liked spending time with was my grandmother. She was so wise and so sweet and spent one week per month with us. One day she was washing clothes and felt a pain in her chest and died. I was 9 years old and standing right next to her. The doctor said we could have saved her if we knew what to do to reanimate her, and I think that was the day I decided to work in the medical field.

"My mom liked the idea but knew I needed good basics to get into a good medical university. I was so excited to go to this new school but the first day I got in, a neighbor told me this school was too good, too expensive and I won't have the level enough to graduate. I went home and talked to my mom, who told me that when someone says you can't do something, you can give up and make that person happy, or work hard and make yourself happy. I choose to work hard and make myself happy.

"I have worked hard making the honor boards in high school and nursing school, and will graduate from law school on December 17. I am a nurse working for Karavan Lasante, the mobile clinic. I like educating patients. I like to see the happiness in their eyes when they get well. I feel what I am doing is important. But most of all, I know that their life is very important and count. They trust me and I don't want to let them fall.

"I hope one day, to have a master degree in public health and have the knowledge to try bigger things. For now, I am doing my part as a nurse and that makes me so happy. My work gives me a sense of purpose to my life. Helping others is the biggest thing that someone can make in their whole life."
